



LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Friends,

As many of you know, the New-York Historical Society received approval last spring from the Landmarks Preservation Commission for renovations to our building that will make it more welcoming and inviting to all our visitors, including those with disabilities. Construction will begin in June, with the first phase of the project focused on 77th Street. This is a very exciting time in our history—not the first change in our 100-plus year-old building, for three annexes were added in the 1930s—but an important one. For the first time ever, visitors in wheelchairs will have full access to our collections, and the original building design that took advantage of the tree-lined connective tissue between the history of the natural world and the history of the nation will finally be realized with a superb set of new windows. [Click here to learn more about the renovation.](#) Construction will bring some temporary changes, including closure of the 77th Street entrance for several months and the relocation of our Museum Shop to the Central Park West side of the building. We do not, however, expect a disruption to our activities and, in fact, will be opening a major new exhibition on “Grant and Lee” in October 2008. The work we are undertaking is, above all, a wonderful sign of the will of friends like you to ensure the vitality of this splendid institution. Generous grants and gifts from the city, the state and private donors have already reached the \$50 million mark. We need your help to reach all of our goals which include, most importantly, an endowment of the size merited by New York’s address for great exhibitions, programs and scholarly resources around the history of our city and nation. French Founding Father: Lafayette's Return to Washington's America

Military tactician. Diplomat. Aristocrat. Benefactor. France’s Marquis de Lafayette came to the Americas to join the fight for independence in 1777 and went on to play a major role in George Washington’s defeat of the British army. More than 40 years later, he returned on a 13-month tour of all 24 states, inspiring the American public in a uniquely galvanizing event in the early history of our nation.
