GEORGE WASHINGTON ON LEADERSHIP

One man's struggles and successes 200 years ago can be a model for leaders today. At every stage of George Washington's career as an executive—as general, president, and tycoon—he had to deal with changing circumstances, from tobacco prices to geopolitics, and with wildly different classes of men, from frontiersmen to aristocrats. Two experts discuss how Washington maximized his strengths and overcame his flaws, and inspires us to do likewise.

Richard Brookhiser is a columnist for *TIME* magazine and senior editor of *National Review*. He is the author of *Founding Father: Rediscovering George Washington*. **Richard Snow** is the former editor-in-chief of *American Heritage Magazine* and the author of a novel about George Washington in the Trenton and Princeton campaigns.

LINCOLN AND DOUGLAS: THE DEBATES THAT DEFINED AMERICA

In 1858, an obscure one-term congressman named Abraham Lincoln mounted a campaign for the United States Senate against the country's most formidable politician, Stephen A. Douglas. Lincoln confronted Douglas on the questions of slavery and the inviolability of the Union in seven fierce debates, and although Lincoln lost his Senate bid, he emerged as a predominant national figure, the leader of his party, and the man who would bear the burden of the national confrontation.

Allen C. Guelzo is the Henry R. Luce Professor of the Civil War Era at Gettysburg College, where he also directs the Civil War Era Studies Program. He is the author of *Lincoln and Douglas: The Debates that Defined America*. **Harold Holzer**, co-chairman of the U.S. Lincoln Bicentennial Commission, has authored, co-authored, or edited 30 books on Lincoln and the Civil War.

2nd New York Provincial Battalion

Raised in 1775, the 2nd New York Provincial Battalion fought under Colonel Philip Van Cortlandt in all phases of the War for American Independence, from the invasion of Canada to the Battle of Yorktown. The re-enactment group was founded in 1971 by two families and is a member of the Brigade of the American Revolution. The regiment now boasts a diverse membership and participates in a variety of events, including battle reenactments, civic demonstrations, and shooting competitions.

SATURDAY, MAY 24 MEMORIAL DAY EXTRAVAGANZA

4th New York Regiment, 85ème Régiment de Saintonge, 35th Regiment of Foot (Royal Sussex Society) & John Koopman III as George Washington

Celebrate Memorial Day at N-YHS with a special program. Meet the pre-eminent founding father of the United States, **George Washington (John Koopman)**. Koopman entered the Revolutionary War re-enacting scene in 1998, and has had the opportunity to portray General Washington in several state and national parks. Also meet the **35th Regiment of Foot of the Royal Sussex Regimental Society**, an organization that "strives to recreate the life and times of the British soldiers, serving His Majesty King George III." Meet one of the original four regiments formed in Albany by the New York Provincial Congress in June 1775. The **4th New York Regiment** saw action in the Battle of Saratoga, Battle of Monmouth and the Sullivan Expedition. Finally, the **85ème Régiment de Saintonge** portrays one of the five regiments of the French army which joined the American forces under General Washington and made a critical contribution to the final defeat of the British Crown forces at Yorktown.

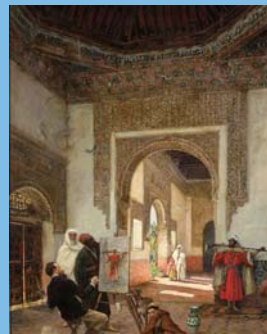

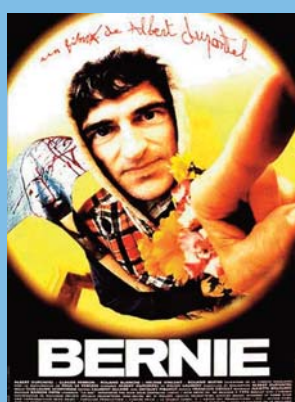
